THE ANGEL, ISLINGTON

A one photo class using patterned paper, doodling, and practicing free hand knife cutting skills.



TIME NEEDED TO COMPLETE CLASS: 1 hour 30 minutes

PROFIT ON COMPLETION: £200 for HANDCUTTING your frame £100 for NOT handcutting a frame



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Supplies Needed:

Cardstock light blue (x1) \cdot Papers: 1 small stripe (Jillibean Soup, Old World Cabbage Stew, Red Peppers) \cdot 1 small spots (My Minds Eye, Quite Contrary, Little Miss Muffet "Delight" Perfect w/Argyle Reverse) \cdot 1 coordinating larger patterned paper (My Minds Eye, Quite Contrary, Little Boy Blue "Curious" Who Loves You) \cdot Alphabet: American Crafts Subway white foam \cdot Tiny alphabet stickers – My Little Shoebox , Blue Jeans \cdot Green String \cdot Bazzill brown spotty sheer ribbon \cdot green spotty sheer ribbon

Tools: to include craft knife \cdot pencil \cdot ruler \cdot brown inkpad \cdot file to distress edges \cdot brown journaling pen \cdot white journaling pen \cdot foam tape/pads

Photo: 1 x 8"x6" landscape

Instructions:

1. Take the piece of blue card-stock, and on the reverse using a ruler and pencil, draw guidelines. One set of guidelines should be drawn approximately 3/4" in from each side, and another set approx. 2 1/2" in from each side. Freehand draw smooth wavy lines using the straight lines as guides as to the approx dimensions required. Use a craft knife to cut the outer edge away, letting the knife flow freely following your drawn lines. Cut away the inner aperture leaving a wide wavy shaped frame. On the reverse side draw a small arrow so you know which way you want it to go on your page.



2. On the reverse side of the brown spotty paper, use the blue card-stock as a template and draw around using a pencil, both the inner and outer edges of the frame. Now draw another wavy frame shape within the frame you just drew, smaller and skinnier, and not necessarily following the same curves as the first. Cut this smaller frame out again using your craft knife and smooth cutting movements. Again draw a small arrow to show the top.








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- 3. Distress the edges of the two frames using a file or edge distresser, and ink the edges. Also ink the edges of the 12x12 striped patterned paper.
- 4. From the contrasting patterned paper cut a piece about $9\ 1/2" \times 3\ 1/2"$ ensuring it is wide enough to fit widthways within the inner edge of the card-stock frame. Adhere to the base stripy card-stock $1\ 1/4"$ up from the bottom, and centrally across the page.

Distress the bottom edge of the photo. By laying the card-stock frame on the page work out where the photo needs to be stuck so none of the other three edges will be visible after the frames are stuck on top. Stick the photo down.







8. Finish the layout by adding the main title, and any smaller title words in the tiny alphabet stickers. If the title has overlapped either of the frames some parts of the letters may need to be supported by by small pieces of foam pads. Journal directly onto the card-stock, and add the date.
